"[The] bike trail [along the east side] is just wide open, so even in the summer the wind gets crazy... there's not a lot of protection or trees."

"A lot of other people use for] walking

[Call State Park dogs, walking trails. That's a popular area."

"...coming [in on Highway 18, going] 45 and then cresting the hill to see that the light [at North Main Street] is changing to red, getting a semi stopped in a hundred feet is kind of difficult, especially if there's traffic there. So, a warning light saying, 'Hey, the light's about to change' would be helpful."

> "I'm a runner and I use the bike trail a lot, but it's not very long. It would be really nice if we could extend that somehow..."

"[River View Cemetery] is a beautiful cemetery, one of the best cemeteries in lowa to ride bikes...you have this great overlook where you see Hormel on one side and the river on the other, and you get this great view down."

"[I like the trail because] it goes out of town a little bit and then there's no traffic at all."

"When I'm old enough I want to ride my bike down to the pool but there's no little bike path that you can ride on."

"One time I was riding a sidewalk [on E Elm Street], then the sidewalk stopped and I wasn't looking down, so...when I got to that point, I fell off my bike. It was really funny, but then I fell in a puddle."

"[The trails] don't really connect. They're all just kind of lead to dead ends."

> "[The parks] are all spread out, so you can go to any one. If you live in a certain part of town, you don't have to travel very far."

"I really think the bike trail is an asset. One of the goals of the community is to continue to grow it and expand it and get people outdoors... It's a safe place for kids to ride, parents to ride, out of traffic for the most part."

"Our city is divided up with a lot of busy roads, we've got the highways that split the town. McGregor is a pass-through for agriculture, and so it's very difficult to find safe routes for young kids on bikes."

"[Riverview Cemetery is] a wonderful place to walk if you're ever alone and just want to be in quiet."

> "Highway 169 divides the schools and bus stops."

"[An] area that concerns me is the Bryant School.. there [are] a lot of kids [who] are getting at that age where they can start walking either home [or to] day care...but there is a major highway that divides [the

school] from most

of the town."

"I just walk in the streets a lot of times...lf I walk at night, I just walk in the middle of the street and especially in the winter because you don't have the ice on the edges and it's normally clear in the center on the crown."

"...we have to cross 169 on our bikes and just ride to the high school [to access the trail] and go all around and then come back and go up straight [to] State Street. If you're walking or pushing a buggy, crossing those two streets is not easy."

"...I work at the library, and when kids leave Seton Elementary and come over, they're crossing...Phillips [at the intersection with Diagonal]...and the cars leave that stop sign and go whizzing by. Five, six years I've just been waiting for a child to get hit crossing from that street to get over to the library."
