Active users walk, bike, and run regularly, either as a component of an activity, to commute, or for recreation/sports training. This group considers lighting, safety, and length as important elements of a recreation trail.

Older adults drive and walk to get around town. When out walking, they appreciate natural beauty and amenities such as benches and drinking fountains.

Youth walk, bike, run, and longboard for recreation. They enjoy playing basketball, baseball, and football at School Park. This group is interested in having more outdoor recreation opportunities.

Parents walk, drive, and bike. They are concerned about the safety of their children. They would like improved access to Savage Park and to the campgrounds in Buffalo Creek Park.

The steering committee bikes, walks, and drives. Committee members want way-finding signage in Coggon to help visitors find their way around the community. Better connectivity is also important to this group.

Savage Park is frequented by residents of all ages. The park features Frisbee golf, grass trails, and a ball diamond, which attracts visitors.

All user groups except active recreationists identified Buffalo Creek Park as an important asset. Residents described it as "beautiful," "peaceful," and "natural." They enjoy fishing, camping, and using the trails at the park.

Adults like to walk in the cemetery. Steering committee members noted that there are good paths in fall as "gorgeous," "actives described the scenery

All groups noted the importance of the many outdoor recreation opportunities in and around Coggon, including City Park, School Park, Savage Park, and Buffalo Creek Park.

Both youth and adults value the natural areas and appreciate the beautiful scenery in the area. One youth said "...when I'm outside, the sound of birds kind of calms me."

Participants in all user groups said that they appreciate the fact that everything in Coggon is within walking/biking distance. Most groups noted that for its size, Coggon has many amenities, such as a grocery store, a gym, a fire station, a power plant, and a bank.

Incomplete, narrow, and broken sidewalks are considered a barrier among residents of all ages. Every group pointed out that for its grocery sidewalk conditions.

Nearly all groups mentioned the poor condition of the streets in town, describing them as "dirty" and "cracked." Specifically, people noted the potholes in Coggon Road and Maple Way Road.

Coggon has no trails in town, which is a concern to some residents. Participants noted that kids have to bike on the edge of the roads which are "choppy." Older adults and parents pointed out that there is no safe access to Buffalo Creek Park for pedestrians and cyclists.

Participants in the steering committee, older adult and active groups brought up the narrow viaduct on Coggon Road as a barrier, because it isn't wide enough for two cars to pass through, much less a pedestrian or cyclist. This problem is worse when there is snow.

All groups commented on the frequent flooding that occurs in Coggon. Water sometimes crosses the road on Coggon Road Railroad Street, and Maple Way Road. When it rains, water runs down 2nd Avenue East and washes out unpaved driveways.

All user types expressed the need for a better sidewalk system throughout town in order to connect popular destinations such as the grocery store, the cemetery, and all of the parks.

Walking and/or biking trails are desired by all groups. Specifically, people want a trail connecting Buffalo Creek Park and Savage Park. Parents, actives, and youth would like a loop trail around Savage Park.

Steering committee members, youth, and active recreationists want more shade in town. Youth identified Main Street as an area in need of more trees. Older adults, parents, and youth would like to have more benches around town. Parents suggested placing benches along a designated walking circuit for benches.

Older adults identified Market Street as a good location
