

Importance of transportation enhancement by type (132 responses)

On a scale of 1 to 5, with 5 being the most important, participants in Hampton ranked making routes to school safer at most important, with a mean value of 3.73, followed by more accessibility for seniors at 3.65. Enhancements that create more physical activity opportunities are also considered priorities. Enhancing the downtown streetscape and screening unsightly views are somewhat important, with mean values above 3. More shade in neighborhoods is least important among respondents, with a mean value below 2.51. These findings are consistent with the views expressed by focus group participants during the Transportation Assets and Barriers workshop held in March 2016, during which pedestrian access emerged as a major issue among both Anglo and Hispanic adults and youth.

Survey Participants Said...

"[We] need safer route[s] for the kids and elderly mostly. Some roads need to be retopped in Hampton too. [We] need sidewalks on routes people walk to schools and roads that don't have any so people can walk on [sidewalks] instead of the roads."

"Hampton has a walking/biking trail that is nicely maintained.

[The] uncontrolled intersection of the route for children walking to school is my only complaint."

"Improve the sidewalks in town so people do not have to walk on the street."

"The transit system to help seniors and those without vehicles is a huge improvement need, especially in the winter. [During] summer the trails are awesome, [but] harder to do in winter."
