<p>Moville's parks are popular destinations because they are venues for many activities, including tennis, basketball, rollerblading and cycling, and community gatherings. The pool is an asset that attracts families.</p> <p>Residents of all ages enjoy the many sports venues available to them, such as the ball fields, the golf course, and the soccer fields, which is also used for flag football and soon will have disc golf.</p> <p>The fairgrounds are an asset because they attract many people to town throughout the year, not just at fair time. Parents like the fairgrounds because it provides a place for their kids to play without dealing with traffic.</p> <p>Both adults and youth appreciate the small-town living that Moville provides. People feel safe because everyone knows and looks out for one another. Parents believe it is a good place to raise kids.</p> <p>Most user types value access to outdoor recreation, notably the walking trail, the golf course, the soccer field, the ball fields, the parks, and the swimming pool. In the winter, youth enjoy sledding on Clay Hill near the soccer field.</p> <p>Residents appreciate the services and amenities available to them, including the school system, health care, the library/community center, the parks, the pool, the fairgrounds, and local businesses.</p> <p>Incomplete, narrow, crumbling and missing sidewalks are a major concern for all groups. Specific areas of concern are the lack of curb cuts throughout town and the lack of good sidewalks to popular destinations such as the ball fields.</p> <p>All user types except the active participants noted issues in the Main Street business district. Older adults said that the tiered sidewalk, on the south side of Main Street is difficult to navigate, and youth reported that the high curbs make biking difficult.</p> <p>Among actives, parents, and older adults, Frontage Road is considered a barrier because it is narrow and has no sidewalks. Actives would like a trail along the road to provide better access to businesses and services there.</p> <p>Most user types agree that the intersection of Fair and Main Streets is problematic, because visibility is impeded by trees unless one pulls out into the intersection.</p> <p>Poor road conditions in various locations throughout Moville make it difficult for pedestrians and cyclists, as well as for drivers. Specific streets identified as rough include N 4th, Jackson, Pearl, N 2nd, and Frontage Road.</p> <p>New sidewalks everywhere is desired by a number of user groups, along with additional curb cuts. Specific connections needed are to the soccer field, the pool, the medical center, and along Highway 140.</p> <p>Several participants suggested extending the walking trail around the golf course to connect to the Fair Street and along Frontage Road. The pool, the soccer field, and along Frontage Road. Older adults think it should be extended down Humboldt.</p> <p>The steering committee and parents believe that Moville would benefit from way-finding signage specifically to the ball fields, the soccer field, the school, and the business district.</p> <p>Older adults and active participants suggested that Frontage road be repaired and widened. Actives would like a trail along the road as well.</p>
